

Limmud Bay Area, Vacaville State Prison, and the Bay Area Jewish Healing Center.

### ABCD for the class/students

#### Audience:

High school students

#### Behavior:

Students who take the class will be able to explain what a chevra kadisha is, will be able to explain what shmira is and what normally happens during shmira, will be able to articulate where their community normally does shmira, and will participate in sitting shmira at least once in the year following the class.

#### Condition:

Students who take the class will participate in shmira when a local member of the Jewish community dies and volunteers for shmira are requested.

#### Degree:

At least 10% of those taking the class will sit shmira at least once within the following year.

### ABCD for the educators who will use the lesson plans:

#### Audience:

Jewish educators in the US and Canada

#### Behavior:

At least 5 Jewish educators (not counting me) will use the lesson plans to teach their students about shmira, to at least a total of 50 students, over the next 3 years. This could happen in a variety of settings, such as Jewish day schools, synagogues, or evening/weekend classes.

#### Condition:

Jewish educators will include these lesson plans in their curriculum for high school students, if they don't already teach them about shmira.

#### Degree:

The lesson plans will be used in at least 5 other institutions, beyond Congregation Rodef Sholom.
